

# Virtual Fox Fest Presenter's Guide

#### Introduction

This document provides instructions and guidance for presenting at Virtual Fox Fest using RingCentral Events (formerly known as Hopin). We recommend reading the entire document ahead of time and then referring to each section at the appropriate time.

## **Terminology**

Here are some terms we'll use throughout this document.

**Backstage**: the area in RingCentral Events from which presentations are given. Attendees have no access to this area and speakers can only enter it via a link provided by the conference organizers.

**Moderator**: one of the conference organizers or another volunteer who will be backstage with you during your presentation. The moderator will help you get set up for your presentation, will start streaming when you're ready, and will keep an eye on the Chat window to address any problems and to keep track of questions.

**Presentation**: this is what we've traditionally called a session, a single instance of a specific topic by a specific speaker. Because RingCentral Events uses the term "session" differently, we'll use "presentation."

**Session**: in RingCentral Events, this is a breakout room where a group of people can meet and talk.

**Stage**: the main presentation area in RingCentral Events, where attendees watch presentations.

**Studio**: the backstage/streaming application RingCentral Events uses for the stage.

# **Advance Preparation**

The items in this section should be done before the day of your presentation. They'll help you prepare, so your presentation runs smoothly.

# Set up your RingCentral Events account

If you didn't do so when you created your RingCentral Events account, set a photo as your avatar so it'll appear in the speaker listing. To do that, click your name on the RingCentral Events main page, choose Personal Profile, then Manage Profile, and then click Upload for the Profile Picture setting.

You can also set additional contact information, such as "headline" (which can be your company name or something else to identify what you do), your bio, an X handle, company website, or LinkedIn address. This information appears in the People panel during the event so attendees can quickly see information about you.

## Set up Slack and join our channel

We'll use a Slack channel for communication among organizers and speakers (such as for troubleshooting) during virtual conferences. If you haven't used Slack before, set up a free account at <a href="https://slack.com">https://slack.com</a>. If this is your first time presenting at Virtual Fox Fest, you should have received an email inviting you to our channel. It's very important to keep the Slack window open (you can have it in a browser, but we recommend downloading and installing the app) during the conference days because that's the mechanism we'll use to keep in touch with you and the best way to get hold of us.

You can direct message any of the conference organizers through Slack to ask for help, as well as chat with other speakers. (If you're dealing with a crisis during the conference, please message all three of us, so whoever is available can help.) The Speaker channel is designed to share ideas or ask questions of your peers. Don't hesitate to reach out if you need help or have a suggestion to other speakers based on your experience during the conference.

#### Consider a headset

In our testing, built-in microphones were generally fine, but consider using a headset for the best audio. If you decide to use a headset, please test it with RingCentral Events ahead of time.

## Think about lighting and background

Pay attention to the lighting and background in the room you're in when you do the presentation. RingCentral Events allows virtual backgrounds for presentations. If you want to use a virtual background, you'll need to set that up once you're backstage.

# **Setting up for RingCentral Events**

We'll provide you with links for the attendee view of the event and for the backstage area from which you'll present. You may want to create bookmarks or desktop shortcuts for both links to make it easy to switch back and forth.

Note that when you are backstage, as soon as you navigate to any other area of the event, you can no longer return backstage without using the link again.

#### **Browser choice**

Plan to use a Chromium-based browser such as Chrome or Microsoft Edge to give your presentation. Although Firefox is also supported, we've seen more problems using Firefox than the others.

# **Enable screen sharing in your browser**




Figure 1. Browser settings for the camera and microphone are found by searching for camera.

Check your browser settings for the camera and microphone. By default, the peripherals are blocked. You can set permissions to allow the camera and microphone for the Web site app.events.ringcentral.com using the page shown in **Figure 1** (this is for Edge; Chrome settings are in Privacy and Security, Site Settings).

## **Test your set-up**

RingCentral Events provides a step-by-step test to see whether your machine is properly configured to participate in a RingCentral Events event. Click <a href="https://pre-event-check.events.ringcentral.com">https://pre-event-check.events.ringcentral.com</a> or, if you're planning to use a different browser than your default, paste that link into the browser. (If you haven't already set up camera and microphone permissions in the browser, this test will make it easy.)

## **Consider using multiple monitors**

We recommend presenting using two monitors with one showing the browser containing the RingCentral Events session, and one showing whatever applications you'll be using for your presentation.




Figure 2. When setting up your PowerPoint presentation, you can specify on which monitor it should display.

PowerPoint allows you to specify which monitor a presentation appears on. The relevant setting is in the Slide Show tab with the label Monitor, as shown in **Figure 2**. The setting is saved with the file, so if you're preparing the slideshow on the same computer where you'll show it, you can set it to the desired monitor, save the file, and use the Show option in Explorer rather than having to open PowerPoint for your presentation. (If you're presenting on a different computer than the one where you created the presentation, you'll need to open the slideshow on the presentation computer, set the desired monitor, and save to take advantage of this capability.)

Put all the applications you'll show on screen onto the same monitor. By doing so, you'll be able to use Alt-Tab during your presentation to switch among them without having to turn screen sharing off and back on.

#### **Consider screen resolution**

Your presentation needs to be readable for attendees, who may be using anything from a giant monitor to a tablet. Plan to either set your screen resolution for your presentation to something like  $1280 \times 720$  or to modify Windows scaling to something more than 100% to enlarge things (in our experience, 150% makes things an acceptable size, but your mileage may vary). Make sure you've sized applications appropriately for whatever resolution or scaling you'll use.

## **Configure for readability**

Set font sizes for Windows, VFP, and any other applications you plan to show to be large enough to be visible to attendees, such as 14 or 16 point. (Keep in mind that some attendees may be watching on monitors much smaller than your own.)

You may want to create a Windows user account just for presentations (thanks to Christof for that idea) that has font sizes already set for the apps you'll show so you don't have to switch font sizes before the presentation and then switch back to normal afterward. This approach also has the advantage of making it easy to hide personal data that might otherwise be visible during your presentation and having a desktop with a minimal number of icons on it.

# **Consider running test events**

Every RingCentral Events user can create events, but only those with paid accounts can publish events. So if you have a paid account, you may want to create one or more test events, so you can practice your session in the environment where you'll give it. You might invite family members or co-workers to come and serve as the audience.

To create a test event, you'll have to create an organization under your account, because only organizations can create events.

# Decide how to handle questions

Attendees cannot speak during a presentation, so they'll type questions into the Chat window. The moderator will organize the questions and read them to you. You can choose to answer questions multiple times during your presentation or wait and take them all at the end. Whichever you choose, please tell the audience what you plan to do and remind them to type their questions into the Chat window for the Stage. (RingCentral Events offers an event-wide Chat window, as well as a Chat window for whatever area you're in at the moment.) It's a good idea to add a slide with this information before or after your Agenda slide so attendees know what to expect.

We've found that many questions asked in Chat get answered by others before the speaker is ready for questions. That streamlines the questions directed at speakers.

## You'll have a Session after your presentation

We will set up a session (that is, a breakout room) for you to meet attendees following your presentation, so you can answer additional questions. We expect you to do that for only 15 minutes or so, but you're welcome to stay longer if you still have attendees who are interested. (Of course, you can leave the session room sooner if there are no questions for you.)

Remind attendees about your Q&A session at the end of your presentation.

## Register for the event

We will send you a link to register for the RingCentral Event. Register as soon as you can after you receive the link. Note that the link to the backstage will not work unless you are registered.

### **Before Your Presentation**

The items in this section should be done just before giving your presentation.

## Reduce your home's or office's bandwidth consumption

Disconnect or turn off any devices that use a lot of bandwidth, such as video streaming, so that your video will broadcast cleanly.

## **Restart your computer**

A few people have run into issues getting their webcams to work (likely because of having used them with other applications), so it's wise to restart before your presentation (or at least at the start of the day).

# Log into your presentation user

If you've created a separate user account, as described in "Configure for readability" earlier in this paper, log out of your regular account and log into that account.

#### **Start Slack**

Have our Slack channel open so we can find you and you can easily communicate with us.

#### **Prevent notifications**

Shut down any applications (like email clients) that have notifications (except, of course, for Slack). Better yet, turn on Window's Focus Assist setting (found in the Tray or search for "focus assist" in the Windows Search bar), which blocks notifications. (When you connect to a projector, Focus Assist turns on automatically, but because your presentation is online, you won't be connecting to a projector.)

## Go backstage

About 15 minutes before the scheduled start of your presentation, leave whatever other area of RingCentral Events you're in. If that area has a Leave button, click the button and then close the tab. Otherwise, you (and ultimately, the audience) will hear echoes. Some speakers had issues with being able to share their audio and video if they just closed a tab without clicking Leave.

Once you've ensured you're not in another RingCentral Events area (but not before the previous speaker finishes their presentation), use the link you've been provided to go to the Backstage area of the event. You'll be met there by the moderator assigned to your presentation, who will have to add you to the stream. (We'll be scheduling the moderators in advance, so you'll know who to expect.)

Set things up the way you want them when your presentation begins. If you want your screen shared initially, then share it backstage. We recommend showing your slides and yourself at the beginning of your presentation.





Figure 3. To share your screen, click Share Screen in the Backstage toolbar.

To share your screen, click Share Screen in the Backstage toolbar (shown in **Figure 3**). The dialog shown in **Figure 4** opens to let you decide what to share. If you're going to use more than one application (such as PowerPoint and Visual FoxPro), it's best to choose the screen that contains those applications. Choose what you want to share and click Share. Once you've shared, your moderator will have to add your screen to the stream.

Once you're all set up, you can minimize or undock the Backstage toolbar, so that it occupies less of the Backstage real estate. Both controls on near the right end of the toolbar, above the Backstage chat. Whether or not you minimize or undock the toolbar, we recommend moving the browser onto a different monitor so that you don't accidentally display it during your session (which would show an infinite recursion of the page to the attendees).

#### **Polls**

RingCentral Events allows you to poll the audience while you're presenting. If you want to post one or more polls during the presentation, prepare the polls ahead of time and paste them into Slack so the moderator can post them via cut and paste. When you do so, indicate the timing of the poll(s) during the session.


Also, be aware that the presentation on Stage runs between 10 and 20 seconds behind what you're actually doing backstage. So, even if people are quick to respond to a poll, there will be some delay before you have results available.

# **During Your Presentation**

The items in this section apply while presenting.

## **Starting the presentation**

When you're ready and it's time for your presentation, the moderator will remove themselves from the stage and click the Go Live button. Note that you will no longer hear them speaking. When the broadcast is live, the message "You are live on stage" appears; see **Figure 5**. That's your signal to start your presentation.

The moderator will stay in the Backstage area throughout your presentation. You can use the Private Backstage Chat to quickly get the moderator's attention. The moderator will be watching both the Private and Stage chats, so they can see what the attendees are saying as well.

# What you'll see

You will not be able to see or hear the audience, so it will be like presenting in an empty room (just as when you rehearse before the conference). That may feel very strange, but just proceed. It's better if you don't mention this to the audience, because they're not having the same experience.

By design, there is about a 10-second delay between Backstage and Stage. (In our tests, the delay has been as short as 5 seconds and as much as 20 seconds.) That is, everything you

say and do backstage shows up on Stage about 10 seconds later. That means that you cannot ask a question, even asking for responses in Chat, and then wait for replies.


#### What to show

The moderator controls what shows up on stage. While RingCentral Events offers a variety of views, the two we will use are called "Crop" and "Cinema." In Crop layout (shown in Figure 5), anyone backstage and any shared screen appear, with the presenter(s) to the right. In Cinema layout, only the shared screen appears.

Of course, in Crop layout, the shared screen is smaller. Unless you tell your moderator otherwise, they'll set up Crop layout for the opening of your presentation and switch to Cinema layout after you finish your "About me" slide.

# Hide the "Stop sharing" window

When you initially share your screen, a window shows up near the bottom of the screen as shown in **Figure 6**. You can hide it by clicking the Hide link on this window. You still can stop sharing your screen by choose Stop Screen from the toolbar in the Backstage window in the browser.

## Share how you want to handle questions

Tell the audience how you want to address questions. Some speakers prefer to handle questions at the end of the presentation, while others like to answer them during the presentation.

In either case, tell the moderator you're ready for questions and they will read them to you.

#### **Polls**

Tell the moderator when you want them to post a poll that you've prepared (see "Polls" in the "Before Your Presentation" section of this document). To see the results of the poll, you can either choose an answer or click Show Results at the bottom of the Polls panel.

In addition, be sure to tell the audience to switch to the Polls panel to answer the poll. We've found that many people simply type their answer into Chat.

#### **After Your Presentation**

The items in this section should be done following your presentation.

## Leave the stage

When your presentation is done, the moderator will stop broadcasting. Once the Live indicator disappears, click Exit Studio on the Backstage toolbar to exit the backstage area and allow the next presenter to get ready.

#### Go to your Session room

Navigate to the room for your Q&A session in the Sessions area. The Session room is like sitting around in the bar at a live conference, where everyone can speak and some people may just stand behind and listen. If you need a chance for a one-on-one discussion with an attendee (or another speaker), you can do that as well. Use the People section of RingCentral Events to set up a video call with an individual.

## Send any updates

If you have updates to your materials, send them to Tamar as soon as possible.


## Video and Chat will be posted

All RingCentral Events presentations are recorded. We will post all session videos to a site limited to paying attendees within a day or two; later, they may be posted on the public Geek Gatherings YouTube channel (<a href="https://www.youtube.com/@geekgatherings">https://www.youtube.com/@geekgatherings</a>). Videos will not be edited. In addition, we will capture the Stage Chat during your session to a text file and add it to the materials for the conference. You may want to review it to see what questions were asked and answered in Chat to see how the presentation might be improved for the future.

#### **Evaluations**


The evaluations for your sessions are available via the Geek Gatherings Evaluation site (<a href="https://geekgatherings.com/Evaluation">https://geekgatherings.com/Evaluation</a>). We'll provide credentials for you before the conference. Log in with this username/password. Choose the Speaker view from the group near the upper-right corner of the page.

A summary of the evaluations for each session you've given is at the top. Below that is a list of individual evaluations., and below that are the details of the evaluation highlighted in the list. **Figure 7** shows an example.



**Figure 7**. The Speaker view of the Geek Gatherings evaluation site lets you review all evaluations you've received at Geek Gatherings conferences.

To narrow down the middle list to evaluations for a single session or conference, use the filter options in the table headers. For example, to see only evaluations from Virtual Fox Fest 2022 (October), put VFF2022Oct into the textbox under Event Id and make sure that "Begins with" is checked in the dropdown next to it, as in **Figure 8**. You can also sort the tables by clicking on the column headers.



**Figure 8**. You can see evaluations for a single event, topic, or session, or even all those giving particular scores or scores in a particular range using the filters above at the top of the tables.

To read an individual evaluation, click on it in the middle list. To provide context for you, at the bottom of the page, the average scores that attendee gave across all evaluations they've filled out are shown.

If an attendee asked a question or you want to provide clarification of one of their observations, use the Reply link found in the last column of the list.

You can also export your evaluations in CSV, XLS and XLSX formats.
